





10-15	phone calls or emails from patients	1.5
40	repeat prescriptions to review/issue	0.5
30	patients test results to review	0.25
30	clinical letters in	1
5	clinical referrals to write/send	1
3	other letters/reports to write	0.5
1	home visits	0.5
5	queries from colleagues	0.25
	Total	12

What do I like about GP

- Autonomy
- Variety
- Continuity of care
- Own team
- Generalist v specialist

What do I not like about being a GP

- Re-disorganisation (not 'reform') of NHSevery 1-2 years
- Not being able to help the patient
- Low value screening initiated in the private sector
- 'wasting' time changing prescriptions because of stock shortages
- Last minute contract changes
- 'dumping'- primary v secondary/tertiary care




Challenges for primary care

- Partnership model
 - Predicated on good will, not business sense
 - Demographic time bomb in profession
- Work life balance
- Staff shortages, domino effect
- Skill mix
 - How to make best use of ARRS roles
- Social problems
 - inequalities

- 1700 patients per GP (not WTE and includes trainees)








Staff Premises Admin profits for partners

How does the NHS work?

"Free" but......underfunded...but works... mostly




GPs deal with:

most problems including children, gynaecology etc. 90% of all NHS consults, 8% of funding... diagnose and treat acute or chronic illness refer serious illness (NB waiting lists) monitor chronic disease e.g. diabetes screening and prevention e.g. vaccines, cervical cytology blood tests, injections, some minor surgery, etc. Dentistry & Opticians different
